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NEW PARTNERSHIP AIMS TO EQUIP AND RESOURCE THE CHURCH TO RELEASE THE POTENTIAL OF THE AGEING POPULATION

A new initiative between five leading Christian charities was launched today focusing on the profound societal consequences of the ageing UK population. Faith in Later Life seeks to present the challenge in a way that will inform, equip, encourage and inspire individual Christians and churches to lead the change needed so that older people in every community in the UK can live fulfilled, productive and dignified lives.

As a partnership between Pilgrims' Friend Society, The Salvation Army, London City Mission, Mission Care, and Keychange Charity, the campaign identifies that far too often an ageing population is portrayed in terms of being an 'issue' and 'problem'. But the attitude towards older people described in the Bible is very different and a very real challenge to 21st century Christians in the UK.

Lord Mackay of Clashfern, who hosted the launch said, *"The Bible describes older people as having a vital role to play in the church and in society and we are blessed that advances in medicine mean that there will be a significant increase in their numbers. Many of these will be Christians who will be seeking to know how they can continue to work out their faith in later life. Many are living increasingly lonely and isolated lives and they need to hear the good news of the gospel. These are significant opportunities and challenges and I am delighted that "Faith in Later Life" has been launched to help churches and Christian people respond."*

Faith in Later Life has commissioned a study by London Seminary into the theology of old age and built a library of information and resources relative to later life which will be accessible via a new website. In addition, the website brings together different evangelism resources for use with older people and provides links and ideas on how best to engage those who are in later life.

Alan Hare, Project Manager for Faith in Later Life commented, *"If Jesus were alive today to survey the harvest field for his Church he would have noticed many older people. Faith in Later Life seeks to inspire and equip Christians living with and working with older people as other organisations have been doing over many years for Christian youth work. Key Statistics

The Bible celebrates older people as deserving honour and having a vital role to work with following generations and the good news is that:

- One in three children born today are expected to reach 100
- The number of people aged over 90 has almost tripled in the last thirty years or so to just under 1m
- By 2035 almost 1 in 2 adults will be aged over 65

The Bible describes people in relationship with God and each other but:

- 1.2 million older people in England are chronically lonely and have been coping with loneliness for years (Age UK)
- Nearly half a million people over the age of 60 usually spend every day alone (Age UK)
- A further half a million usually go at least five or six days a week without seeing or speaking to anyone at all (Age UK)
- More than a third (39%) of people with dementia said they felt lonely (Alzheimer's Society)

Many church leaders and Christians struggle to talk about their theology in terms that make sense to people who lack mental capacity and their families yet:

- There are an estimated 850,000 people with dementia in the UK (Alzheimer's UK)
- And although the incidence of dementia is dropping, numbers could rise to over 1 million by 2025 and 2 million by 2051.
- Most people in the UK know someone whose capacity to "decide for Christ" and to "remember their creator" is impaired by dementia.
